Pastor's Letter



Embarking on the 2024 Ghana Study Tour: A Journey of Discovery and Reflection

As you may know on October 4th I will join the Wabash Pastoral Leadership Cohort on our study tour to Ghana. We are preparing for a transformative experience that promises both personal and professional growth. This carefully planned journey is designed to deepen understanding of counter-narrative storytelling, explore community well-being through the lens of ubuntu, and forge stronger connections among pastoral leaders. Here's a closer look at the goals and the exciting opportunities that lie ahead.





Exploring Counter-Narrative Storytelling

A core focus of the tour is to engage with the practice of counter-narrative storytelling. These narratives provide a platform for voices that have historically been marginalized or silenced. By immersing ourselves in these stories, we will gain insight into the lived experiences of Ghanaian communities and understand the power of narrative in shaping perceptions and histories.

Learning from Faith and Civic Leaders

Ghana's churches, faith communities, and civic leaders play a crucial role in addressing contemporary challenges and fostering community well-being. The tour will offer us the chance to witness firsthand how these leaders are responding to issues such as social inequality, environmental sustainability, and economic development. Through discussions and observations, we aim to uncover innovative approaches and practical solutions that can inspire similar efforts in our own communities.

Understanding Ubuntu and Community Well-Being

Ubuntu, an African philosophy centered on interconnectedness and communal values will be a key theme throughout our journey. By exploring this concept, we hope to broaden our understanding of community well-being and expand our pastoral imagination. Ubuntu, (sometimes translated as "I am because we are") emphasizes the collective nature of humanity, highlighting the importance of mutual support and shared responsibility in fostering a thriving community.

Fostering Spiritual and Theological Growth

The tour is designed to nourish the spiritual and theological growth of the Wabash Pastoral Leaders. Through exposure to Ghanaian faith practices, theological discussions, and communal experiences, participants will have the opportunity to enrich their spiritual lives and gain new perspectives for their pastoral work.

Building a Stronger Peer Group

In addition to individual growth, the tour aims to enhance bonding among the Wabash Pastoral Leaders. By sharing this experience and engaging in collective reflection, participants will develop a stronger sense of camaraderie and support, fostering a significant and supportive peer network.

Reflecting on the Transatlantic Slave Trade

A poignant aspect of the tour will be exploring the historical impact of the Transatlantic Slave Trade. By examining the legacy of this period, we will gain insights into how its trauma resonates today, including its implications for communities in Indiana. This reflection will deepen our understanding of historical injustices and their ongoing effects.

Identifying Christian Resources and Practices

Ghanaian Christian thought and practice offer valuable resources for spiritual guidance and community support. The tour will provide an opportunity to explore these resources, learning from local traditions and practices that can inform and enrich Christian life and ministry.

Experiencing Ghana's Natural and Cultural Beauty

Finally, participants will be introduced to Ghana's rich cultural heritage and natural beauty. From vibrant markets and historic sites to stunning landscapes and traditional festivals, the tour promises a well-rounded experience of Ghana's diverse and dynamic culture.

The insights gained will not only enhance our professional practices but also enrich our personal lives, fostering a deeper understanding of interconnectedness and shared humanity. Please keep us in your prayers as we travel to New York and then to Ghana on October 4th-5th, as we stay in Ghana, and then as we return on October 15th- 16th.

Pledge Sunday Oct 20th: How Much to Give and Why: A Reflection on Stewardship

Because of your generous gifts of time, talents, and treasures, OSLC and PLM continue in God's call and ministry.


On Sunday, September 29th, you had the opportunity to pick up our Stewardship Packets after church. If you were not available to pick them up, we mailed them out on September 30th. So please look for them in the mail. Pledge (Commitment) Sunday, is on Oct 20th, and we invite you to return your pledges on the 20th or before. You may place them in the offering or mail them using the included envelope.

Stewardship is a call to recognize everything we have as a gift from God and respond with gratitude. It's about more than just money—it's an invitation to use our time, talents, and treasure for the benefit of others and the glory of God. And, as the Finance Team begins to reconcile the 2025 budget requests with our projected 2025 income, it is crucial they have a reasonable understanding of the congregation's total pledges. (Your personal pledges are always kept confidential). When it comes to how much to give, the answer lies not in a strict formula but in a heart of generosity, rooted in trust and faith.

In the Bible, we find the concept of the tithe, giving 10% of one's income, as a traditional benchmark. For many, this is a meaningful starting point, a tangible way to honor God with their resources. However, giving is deeply personal and varies according to individual circumstances. While the tithe is a useful guide, God calls us to give according to what we

have, not what we don't. For some, giving 10% may feel sacrificial, while for others, it may be just the beginning of their capacity to give. Please take a moment to read the graph below. I requested our Financial Secretary to create this as a way of illustrating each family's or individual's giving trends each year.

My invitation to you is to spend some time in prayer about your pledge and see if you might be able to increase it for 2025. If you are not able to increase your tithe, we greatly appreciate everything you already do for OSLC. And we will be very grateful if you are able to increase your tithe in 2025.



The "why" of stewardship goes beyond obligation. Giving is a way to align our hearts with God's purposes, recognizing that we are simply caretakers of the resources God has entrusted to us. Jesus teaches us in Matthew 6:21, "For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also." Generosity shifts our focus away from materialism and self-centeredness toward a mindset of abundance and service. When we give, we grow in trust, believing that God will provide for our needs even as we share what we have.

Stewardship is also a response to the needs of the world. Through our giving, we participate in God's work, supporting ministries, helping the poor, and contributing to the mission of the Church. Whether you give to OSLC, PLM, other charitable organizations, or individuals in need, your contributions make a tangible difference.

Ultimately, how much to give is a prayerful decision, guided by love and trust in God's provision. Generosity reflects our faith in action, a living expression of gratitude for the abundance we have received.

Thank you for all you do, your continued support of loving and serving God and neighbor. You are appreciated and loved. You are a child of God, deserving of love and respect and God will use you to change the world

Faith Formation September News



As part of our Christian spiritual practices, we've learned about the importance of letting go. By releasing our desires, worries, agendas, and attachment to outcomes, we create space for God to work in our lives. It feels especially fitting that this invitation comes as we enter the fall season.

It's often said that creation is the first word of God. When we still ourselves long enough to be fully present, watching and listening to nature, we can tune into the quiet whisperings of our Creator.

Fall offers a powerful, visual, and sensual example of letting go. As day gives way to night, we are invited into a rhythm of rest, alongside creation. Trees draw in their chlorophyll, revealing the beauty of their leaves before gently releasing them to the earth. Those fallen leaves become nourishment, returning as humus to enrich the soil and nurture the trees. The cooling air signals the earth's preparation for rest, a reminder of the sacredness of the natural cycles of release and renewal.

What you do:


- Fill the box with small stones to weigh it down. Tape the box securely closed.

In *The Pumpkin Patch Parable*, Liz Curtis Higgs uses kid-friendly analogies for the Christian life. Many parents now use a Pumpkin Prayer while carving jack-o-lanterns in October. What a great reminder about everything God has done for us!

- While cutting off the pumpkin top, pray, "Lord, open my mind so I can learn new things about you." (See Proverbs 1:7.)
- While removing the seeds and pulp, pray, "Remove the things in my life that don't please you. Forgive the wrong things I do and help me forgive others." (See Matthew 6:14-15.)
- While making eyes, pray, "Open my eyes to see the beauty you've made in the world around me." (See Psalm 104:24.)
- While making the nose, pray, "I'm sorry for the times I've turned up my nose at your many gifts." (See James 1:17.)
- While making the mouth, pray, "Let everything I say please you." (See Psalm 19:14.)
- While lighting the candle, pray, "Lord, help me shine your light to others through the things I do." (See Matthew 5:16.)
- Display your carved pumpkins as examples of how God's love transforms us into new creations. (See 2 Corinthians 5:17.)
