A Year of Listening, Learning, and Leaning into God's Future

As 2025 draws to a close, I find myself feeling a deep, steady gratitude for this congregation and for the ways God has been moving in our midst. When we stepped into the year back in January, we carried with us a simple but hopeful theme: **“A New Year of Faith, Hope, and Community.”** It wasn’t meant to be a slogan. It was meant to be a posture — a way of approaching the year with open hands and open hearts. And looking back, that posture shaped every step we took.

If there was one thread running through everything this year, it was this: **we listened.**

We listened to God in prayer.

We listened to one another in worship and conversation.

We listened to our neighbors, our Purdue students, and our community partners.

And slowly, through that shared listening, a picture began to emerge — not only of who we are, but of who God is inviting us to become.

Listening as a Way of Life- Our long-term discernment journey continued this year, but with an important shift. We began moving from simply *asking* questions to actually *testing* possibilities. Early in 2025, our congregation revisited what we mean by discernment: staying faithful to God’s vision, seeing with Jesus’ eyes, listening deeply, and responding with love. That grounding helped us step into the next phase with intention.

In the spring and summer, our **On Our Way Forward** gatherings invited us into honest, hopeful conversations. Together, we named five areas where God’s Spirit seemed to be stirring us:

- using our building more intentionally for hospitality;
- deepening relationships with Purdue students;
- exploring partnerships for childcare;
- responding to food insecurity with meals or produce;
- and trying short-term ministry experiments to learn what fits our gifts.

These conversations didn’t just generate ideas — they generated energy.

Faith Growing Across the Generations- Even as we explored the future, our weekly ministry continued to deepen. Worship remained the anchor of our life together, with festival Sundays enriched by the faithful leadership of our choir under Julie Huetteman’s direction, and with musicians, readers, ushers, and communion assistants offering their gifts each week.

Our faith formation ministries flourished, too. Godly Play continued to nurture our children’s holy imagination, while intergenerational gatherings — from assembling school kits to Advent crafts to Lenten service projects — reminded us that faith is something we hand to one another, not something we do alone.



Pastor's Letter Continued



This spring brought a bittersweet transition as we celebrated Missy Schroeder's call to serve as the Indiana-Kentucky Synod's Director for Evangelical Mission. Her ministry shaped OSLC in countless ways, and while we miss her presence among us, we rejoice in the Spirit's call on her life. We are equally grateful for Erin Thompson, who has stepped with grace and skill into expanded responsibilities as both Office Administrator and Faith Formation Director. Her joyful presence and expertise have been a steady gift in a season of change.

Serving Within and Beyond Our Walls- Service remained a core expression of our identity this year. From sewing quilts and assembling school kits for Lutheran World Relief to supporting local hunger ministries, OSLC continued to invest in the well-being of our neighbors. One of the most powerful experiences came through the **Mission Guatemala** trip, where members of OSLC and PLM joined together in construction, healthcare, and education work. Their stories reminded us that God's presence is just as alive in the hills of Guatemala as it is in the heart of West Lafayette.

And speaking of West Lafayette — change is everywhere. If you've driven near Purdue recently, you know the landscape is shifting almost monthly. But amid that rapid growth, we rediscovered something essential: **our mission hasn't changed**. We are still called to welcome. We are still called to serve. And we are still called to be a place where people experience Christ's compassion.

Dreams Taking Shape- By late summer, we formed the Property Development Team, because we found ourselves dreaming boldly about how our land and building might serve future generations—whether through hospitality, community partnerships, care for students and families, or even long-term visions like housing or shared community space. Others imagined our current buildings as a weekday hub for creativity, learning, community meals, or simply a safe place for students to rest and belong. The Spirit's nudging felt unmistakable: God's "new thing" is springing up, and we are learning to perceive it.

A Gift of Renewal- As the year ends, we celebrate an incredible blessing: OSLC was awarded a **\$59,954 Lilly Clergy Renewal Grant** to support my 2026 sabbatical, "Finding God in the Familiar." This is not only a gift for me, but a gift for our entire congregation — an invitation into shared renewal, reflection, and rest.

Moving Forward with Hope- So what can we say about 2025? It was a year of grace and courage. A year of holy listening. A year of new ideas taking their first steps. And a year where we rediscovered again and again that **Love wins. God wins.**

Thank you, beloved church, for walking this journey with faithfulness and joy. May the Spirit continue to guide us into God's future — with open hands, open hearts, and unwavering hope.


Stewardship

On Our Way Forward - Property Discernment Update – Session 4: Moving from Ideas to Impact



Throughout November, OSLC held three separate gatherings—via Zoom, at Pints with a Pastor, and during Adult Forum—to complete Session 4 of our congregational discernment process. This final session focused on one central goal: **moving from ideas to action** as we continue exploring faithful ways to use our property for ministry, mission, and community impact.

Across all three meetings, Pastor Randy provided updates on work happening since Session 3.

The **Property Development Team (PDT)** continues meeting regularly and expanding its circle of conversation partners. Guests invited to the November PDT meeting included Pastor Kristen from PLM, Grace Pomroy from Luther Seminary (who works extensively with congregations discerning property use), and Dave Harder, Director of Placemaking for Relèven.

OSLC is also working with a Purdue professor whose spring-course project will focus on envisioning what is possible on our property—helping us explore the feasibility and cost of various ideas. Childcare conversations remain paused during the school year, though still very much a part of future planning.

Across all three November gatherings, several themes and insights emerged:

1. Prioritizing What Is Most Doable

Participants noted that some ideas—such as providing student study space or reengaging childcare partnerships—could be pursued more quickly. Larger initiatives like affordable housing would require significant planning, debt considerations, and partnerships. Many expressed the desire for OSLC to maintain mission-driven control of any project while avoiding becoming full-time landlords.

2. Strengthening Congregational and Community Engagement

There was strong support for keeping the congregation updated and involved. Suggestions included quarterly updates from the PDT during Adult Forum and related articles in *The Evangel*. Several participants proposed hosting neighborhood conversations or inviting community partners to the table, such as the New Chauncey Neighborhood Council, the West Lafayette Housing Director, and those involved in the West Lafayette Library development.

3. Identifying Resources and Potential Partners

Participants recommended contacting financial partners such as PFCU, the Mission Investment Fund, and experts like Sam Burns. Others highlighted local leaders knowledgeable about housing—including Al Davis of Holy Trinity—and organizations focused on childcare. As OSLC continues exploring possibilities, understanding costs, financing, and long-term sustainability will be essential.

4. Clarifying the Property Landscape

A significant portion of the Adult Forum conversation focused on the PLM House and its shared ownership between OSLC and PLM, including a longstanding lien from LuMin (formerly NLCM). This discovery underscored the importance of assessing all existing commitments, partnerships, and legal structures before moving forward.

5. Emerging Ideas for the Future

The PDT has identified three potential directions for the Purdue class to explore—from replacing the PLM and rental houses with a new multi-story building, to constructing a larger structure with parking, to redeveloping the entire block. Participants encouraged focusing on two options initially and emphasized the need to clarify ownership, mission alignment, and feasibility. Other ideas include shared worship partnerships, keeping the current church building, and exploring flexible community and student spaces.

Across all gatherings, one theme was clear: **OSLC remains committed to thoughtful, prayerful, Spirit-led discernment**. The congregation is energized by the possibilities, realistic about challenges, and united in ensuring that whatever we build—physically or relationally—serves our mission and reflects Christ’s love for our neighbors.

Look for continued updates in future issues of *The Evangel* and through Adult Forum in the new year. In the meantime, please keep our congregation, our Property Development Team, and all our partners in your prayers as we take faithful steps toward the future God is calling us to build together.



Council Highlights



- **Sabbatical Committee:** Update on Sabbatical Committee to take care of tasks during Pastor Randy's sabbatical (March 30th through July 13th, 2026): Pastor Kristen will be available for pastoral care and will preach once each month during Pastor Randy's absence.
 - Pastor Randy recommends a committee of three or four members, with at least one council member.
 - Primary duties will be to find supply pastors; plan a catered dinner at church during the sabbatical plus a celebration dinner upon Pastor Randy's return; and arrange for house parties around the Final Four tournament.
- **Annual Meeting:** Set for January 18, 2026 (one week earlier than usual to accommodate Purdue Music Organization participation in the January 25th service and a larger concert afterwards).
- **Election of new Council President:** A motion was made, seconded, and passed to elect Bob Nielsen as Council President for the remainder of Sandra Vana's vacated term (May 2026).
- **Community Partnerships:** A Roundtable Discussion revolving around DEI and Environmental Justice have begun Monthly, run by Aaron Thompson. These meetings will be lunch meetings.
- **PLM:** The number of participants has dropped for Breaking Bread some from the beginning of the year, but it is now holding steady and represents a significant increase over last year.



Our Christmas celebrations are now a memory, Lord, but help us know Christmas joy all year long.



Dear Rostered, Lay, and Congregational Leaders,

The peace of Christ be with you always!

I write with gratitude, hope, and trust in the name of the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. Amen.

Now, after a year in this role, I am deeply grateful for how the Spirit is moving among us. The small steps we take following Jesus are like a rudder guiding a ship. We have seen new relationships form, old relationships renewed, new leaders emerge, congregations experience new life, and trust rebuilt; and this is only the beginning, as there is still much work to be done. New gifts are emerging in our work together, reflecting the many blessings we've received and the remarkable progress we've made as a Synod of the ELCA. Although mission support has decreased recently—similar to what many congregations have faced—we remain hopeful through God's grace. What unites us all is our commitment to walk together—journeying in gratitude, hope, and trust—as we seek to serve both God and neighbor, for the life of the world and for the sake of the gospel. Yes, I believe this!

Whenever I write mission support letters, I am reminded that such support—our collective effort to share resources and blessings for ministry—is a profound act of discipleship. This effort reflects our shared values of grace, hope, and trust, grounding our lives and work as the body of Christ. In our journey, we do not pray for specific results; instead, we pray for God's will to be done among us. We leave the outcome to God! By grace, we strive to live into what God is already doing for us and through us, trusting in God's ongoing work in our lives.

At the heart of mission support is grace, grounded in the love and generosity we first receive from God. This love starts with the air we breathe, literally, and is reflected in the crucified and risen Christ. It is renewed daily by the Holy Spirit through our baptisms. In response, we are thankful for God's incredible grace in every part of our lives. By focusing on the good—even amid challenges—and showing gratitude through our giving and partnerships, we cultivate a lifestyle and a lasting mindset of thankfulness and grace. These practices strengthen our community of faith and remind us that every offering, whether big or small, is meaningful in God's hands.

To illustrate this, consider Zacchaeus, the tax collector. He climbed a tree out of curiosity, but what truly changed his life was Jesus seeing him, calling him by name, and offering grace. Zacchaeus's response—generosity and restitution—stemmed from a heart transformed by undeserved love. Similarly, our mission support isn't merely a duty; it's a heartfelt response to God's abundant grace—an act of reflecting Christ's love through tangible actions that restore lives and communities.

Along with grace, hope is also essential to our calling. Mission support elevates ministries that serve, teach, and bring hope to others. It represents an investment in the future, showing faith in what God will still accomplish in and through us. Our support today becomes a promise of hope for tomorrow's leaders, worshipers, and communities. Cultivating hope in Christ as a daily way of living through prayer, mission, and generosity helps us endure trials, rejoice in blessings, and stay confident in God's promises.

One example that comes to mind is last August at Cross of Christ Lutheran Church in Crown Point, IN. Their mission support gift was given to me in person after a difficult season and a renewed sense of hope. It was more than just a financial gift; it was a sign of the resilience of faith and hope in the Spirit's work among the congregation. Each gift, like theirs, acts as a thread of hope woven into the fabric of our shared ministry, even in small yet impactful churches and places where God is active. The moment this gift was handed to me was truly touching, highlighting the deep connection and heartfelt faith of Cross of Christ Lutheran Church and its leaders, and serving as a powerful reminder of the strength of community and life-giving hope.



We warmly invite those who haven't yet given to find new ways to trust in God's everlasting grace and to share their blessings generously, just as God has blessed us. We also lift up in prayer those who feel hesitant or hold back their gifts, asking God to touch their hearts and bring comfort to their worries.

While we remain committed to our witness of Christ and express our gratitude, we also pray that hope and trust continue to guide our collective efforts. Looking ahead, our shared vision stays rooted in gratitude for what God has already done, hope for what is yet to come, and trust that God walks alongside us. As we build communities where these values influence every decision and act of service, our mission support becomes more than just a transaction — it becomes a living testimony to our unity. We are called and sent for the life of the world and the sake of the gospel.

Let us move forward with gratitude, hope, and trust in God's promises. May our shared journey, strengthened by mission support, bring lasting transformation through Christ our Lord.

- We will be singing during worship on Sunday, 12/21, and on Christmas Eve, 12/24.



Christmas Card treasures




Turn old Christmas cards into beautiful keepsake ornaments! It's a fun, simple way to give new life to cards you've received and add a handmade touch to your tree.


